How to get here

Work hard and do your best during your senior year, and you'll stay on track for admission to ASU. Here's what you need:

Complete ASU's competency requirements:

- ☑ 4 years of math
- ☑ 4 years of English
(non-ESL/ELL courses)
- ☑ 3 years of lab sciences
(1 year each of biology,
chemistry, earth science,
integrated sciences or physics)
- ☑ 2 years of social sciences
(including 1 year of American history)
- ☑ 2 years of same second language
- ☑ 1 year of fine arts or 1 year of
career and technical education

Steps to apply to ASU

Step 01



Complete an undergraduate admission application.

Submit the ASU admission application or apply with the Common Application.
asu.edu/apply | commonapp.org

Step 02



Self-report your grades or request a transcript.

You can either self-report your grades on your application or request a transcript from your high school. If you choose to request a transcript, you will finish your admission application faster (less than 20 minutes). If you choose to self-report your grades, you will receive your admission decision sooner.

Choose to not self-report



Quicker application process, but takes a little longer for an admission decision.

Choose to self-report



Application takes longer to complete, but admission decision comes much faster.

Step 03



Pay the application fee.

If your financial circumstances qualify you for an application fee waiver, you will check the appropriate box, and your application fee will automatically be waived and post to your account.

Step 04



Activate ASURITE and check your application status.

Check your application status and any Priority Tasks you need to complete in My ASU using your ASURITE User ID, which is sent to you after you apply for admission.

Create your FSA ID

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid for the 2023–2024 academic year opens Oct. 1, but you can set up your FSA ID now to get ready to file the FAFSA. You'll need to create an FSA ID in order to electronically sign and submit your FAFSA. If you are a dependent, your parent will also need to create an FSA ID.

The FAFSA

Starting Oct. 1 of your senior year, you can fill out the online Free Application for Federal Student Aid to determine how much federal money you're eligible to receive.

Free gift aid you don't pay back

Grants

Need-based aid that requires you to file a FAFSA. Free money.

Scholarships

University or private; may be based on accomplishments, personal characteristics or need.

Employment opportunities

Federal Work-Study

Based on need; this is money you earn by working at your school.

On-campus employment

Also money you earn by working as a student employee.

Aid you pay back

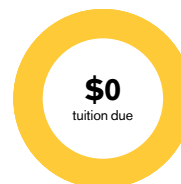
Loans

The Arizona Promise Program

The Arizona Promise Program is a state grant program for Arizona residents that helps fill in the remaining tuition, student initiated fees and undergraduate college fees not covered by your other gift aid (Pell Grant, merit scholarships, etc.). This can be awarded up to four years (eight consecutive semesters).

Obama Scholars Program

Incoming resident first-year students who are eligible to receive a Federal Pell Grant, meet assured admission requirements, and indicate a family income of \$42,400 or less on the FAFSA can receive funding for tuition, student initiated fees and undergraduate college fees, plus a standard allowance for housing, meals, books and supplies for up to four years (eight consecutive semesters). To be considered for the program, a completed application for admission, transcripts and test scores, and the FAFSA are due by Jan. 15.

College Attainment Grant

If you're an incoming resident first-year student and Pell Grant eligible, the College Attainment Grant program provides the same funding to cover tuition, student initiated fees and undergraduate college fees for up to four years (eight consecutive semesters) for those who may not meet the Arizona Promise Program eligibility requirements.
