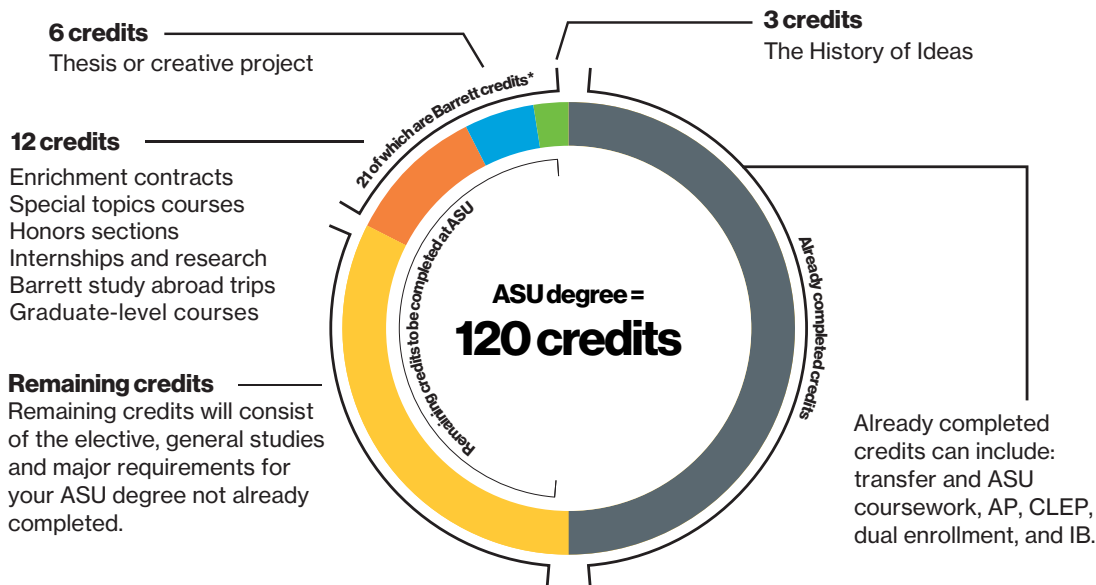

Barrett breakdown



The Barrett Upper Division honors curriculum is designed for students who have completed approximately half of their undergraduate degree program and are looking to enroll in Barrett during the start of what is traditionally considered their third (junior) year. This upper-division option works particularly well for community college students coming to ASU with an earned associate degree.



To apply for Barrett Upper Division admission, the following criteria must be met:

1 Already completed:

A minimum of 54 credit hours recognized by ASU.

- At least 30 of the 54 credits must have been earned after high school or homeschool graduation.
- Courses in progress at the time of Barrett application review will be counted toward the 54-credit minimum with the expectation that they will be successfully completed.

To complete as an ASU Upper Division student:

- At least two years remaining at ASU. Students must have at least two academic years — four semesters, not including summer sessions — and approximately 60 credit hours remaining before intended ASU graduation at the time of Barrett enrollment.
