How to get here

Work hard and do your best during your senior year, and you'll stay on track for admission to ASU. Here's what you need:

Complete ASU's competency requirements:

✓ 4 years of English
(non-ESL/ELL courses)

☑ 3 years of lab sciences (1 year each of biology, chemistry, earth science, integrated sciences or physics)

✓ 1 year of fine arts or 1 year of career and technical education

Most competitive applicants have one of the following:

3.00/4.00 GPA

1120/1600

SAT evidence-based reading and writing plus math

22/36 ACT composite

Top 25% in high school class asu.edu/admission

SAT or ACT scores are optional and not required for admission or merit scholarships.

Steps to apply to ASU

Step 01	Complete an undergraduate admission application. Submit the ASU admission application or apply with the Common Application. asu.edu/apply commonapp.org	
Step 02	Self-report your grades or request a transcript. You can either self-report your grades on your application or request a transcript from your high school. If you choose to request a transcript, you will finish your admission application faster (less than 20 minutes). If you choose to self-report your grades, you will receive your admission decision sooner.	
	Choose not to self-report Quicker application process, but takes a little longer for an admission decision.	
	Choose to self-report Application takes longer to complete, but admission decision comes much faster.	
Step 03	Pay the application fee. If your financial circumstances qualify you for an application fee waiver, you will check the appropriate box, and your application fee will be automatically waived and post to your account.	
Step 04	Activate your ASURITE User ID and check your application status. Check your application status and any Priority Tasks you need to complete in My ASU using your ASURITE User ID, which is sent to you after you apply for admission. my.asu.edu	
Step 05	Stay on top of important deadlines. Check this important deadlines page we created to help students stay up to date on all of ASU's admission and financial aid deadlines. vourfuture.asu.edu/importantdeadlines

Standardized test scores

Currently, SAT or ACT scores are optional and not required for admission or merit scholarships. We encourage students to submit their test scores if they have them, as it may qualify students for admission to programs with higher requirements, make up for course deficiencies and make them eligible for larger merit-based awards. scholarships.asu.edu/estimator



Higher admission requirements

Some programs at ASU have higher admission requirements. Should you select one of these programs, you will be asked to select a second major without higher requirements.

2025-2026 FAFSA opening fall 2024

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid for the 2025–2026 academic year opens fall 2024, but you can set up your FSA ID now to get ready to file the FAFSA. You'll need to create an FSA ID to electronically sign and submit your FAFSA. If you are a dependent, your parent (contributor on the FAFSA) will also need to create an FSA ID. **studentaid.gov**

Net price calculator

The net price calculator helps incoming first-year students estimate how much financial aid, scholarships and grants they might be eligible for to help pay for college. This will give a general idea of your out-of-pocket costs — your net price.

The Arizona Promise Program

The Arizona Promise Program is a state grant program for Arizona residents who are eligible to receive a Federal Pell Grant. This can be awarded for up to four years (eight consecutive semesters). To be considered for this program, submission of a completed 2025–2026 FAFSA will be required by ASU's FAFSA priority date (to be announced at a later date). **students.asu.edu/arizona-promise-program**

Valued at \$13,353

Covers tuition and fees. Must be Pell-eligible.

ASU Obama Scholars Program

Incoming resident first-year students who are eligible to receive a Federal Pell Grant, meet assured admission requirements, and indicate a family income of \$42,400 or less on the FAFSA can receive funding for tuition, student initiated fees and undergraduate college fees, plus a standard allowance for housing, meals, books and supplies for up to four years (eight consecutive semesters). To be considered for this program, a completed application for admission is due by Jan. 15. Submission of a 2025–2026 FAFSA will be required by ASU's FAFSA priority date (to be announced at a later date).

Valued up to \$28,091*

Covers tuition and fees. Must be Pell-eligible. Eligible students may also receive funding for housing, meals, books and supplies.

*Your award is dependent on your Student Aid Index.

Arizona Proposition 308

The passage of Prop. 308 means that qualifying noncitizen students, regardless of immigration status, may be eligible for instate tuition and certain types of financial aid at ASU. Students who are qualifying noncitizens can complete the CSS Profile, an online application used to determine eligibility for nonfederal institutional aid, starting in October.


